Our Priority Sectors

EDUCATION

World Vision focuses on increasing literacy outcomes for girls and boys between grades 1 to 4. We support schools in the establishment of early childhood education centres which provide a better learning environment for younger learners on school premises, including WASH infrastructure for children in school and out of school. To compliment what children learn in school, and working together with the local community, we have established Reading Awareness Workshops for parents and Reading Camps for students between grades 1 to 4.

HEALTH AND NUTRITION

World Vision Zambia wants to ensure mothers, newborns and under-5 children have access to quality essential health care services by contributing to the reduction of maternal and child mortality through improved health and nutrition practices. World Vision's health and nutrition strategy is a package of preventative interventions for mothers and children under two, targeting the first 1,000 days.

CHILD PROTECTION

World Vision addresses child rights violations that negatively affect children and reduce their ability to realize their full potential. These include, child marriage; low birth registration; and sexual and physical abuse. To end these rights violations, World Vision focuses on capacity building for community members; improve child protection services; end child marriage; and child protection advocacy banning traditional practices that negatively impact children.

RESILIENCE AND LIVELIHOOD

World Vision improves household resilience and livelihood by improving access to financial services; enhancing enterprise profitability; empowering entrepreneurs to access sustainable markets for their products; and improving community capacities to protect and restore their natural resources.

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

World Vision improves the water, sanitation and hygiene status of vulnerable communities. Our approach focuses on ensuring children, families, communities and institutions have access to safe; equitable and sustainable clean water; dignified sanitation; and they practice appropriate hygiene behaviour.

EMERGENCY AFFAIRS

Through emergency relief, World Vision helps people affected by conflict and disasters. We are working in three refugee settlements and host communities improving their health status, psychosocial well-being and access to basic services, such as food, shelter, water and sanitation. Since 2018 we have responded to over 20 humanitarian emergencies.



World Vision is a Christian relief, development and advocacy organisation dedicated to working with children, families, and their communities to reach their full potential by tackling the root causes of poverty and injustice.

World Vision began working in Zambia in 1981 and are a Zambian Non Government Organization with a local Board of Directors. World Vision has a vast reach in Zambia, with long-term development projects called Area Programmes, as well as grant-funded projects that are spread across the country nationwide.
